#### **AGM REPORTS FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31 AUGUST 2023**

### Chair's report

This year for the first time the Chair's role has been held by co-chairs in rotation – Louise Brown and Anna Stickland, Jo Brooks and Anne Otley, Alison Dickens and Clare Revera and Geraldine Poore and me. This report started as an initial draft by me but now also includes additions and improvements from all my colleagues.

In preparing an initial draft I started by looking at past reports and was reminded what a turbulent time the last three or four years have been, for the BA as well as life in general, but thankfully fhis year seems to have been much more normal.

At our last AGM Geraldine commented that it was good to see "green shoots of basketry meetings and courses starting to grow". We have built on this with the BA running a successful Spring School at Harrogate again, although sadly one tutor (Sue Kirk) was unable to teach due to Covid. Our remining tutors (Rachael South, Clare Revera, Tim Johnson and Monica Guilera) generously agreed to each teach an additional student, and Eddie Glew agreed to take two additional students in his class. The event had a good buzz and beautiful baskets and chair seats were produced.

Autumn School was also well received, with three very different courses all fully subscribed from tutors Mel Bastier, Rosie Farey and Anna Turnbull. Unfortunately, the venue in Derbyshire is no longer able to offer us weekend bookings, and so we will need to try a new location for Autumn School in 2024.

Using the website for bookings helps a great deal with the organisation of the schools.

The BA's summer meeting built on last year's AGM theme of willow growing, with a visit to the National Willow Collection at Rothamsted. Members enjoyed a hot day in the willow fields with an interesting tour and talk from William MacAlpine, Rothamsted's willow breeder. Additionally, during the summer various local groups met up in local willow beds, to share experiences of willow growing or just enjoy meeting up.

Elsewhere the appetite for workshops remains unabated, with successful City and Guilds courses run at Westhope and workshops run by individual members often fully subscribed with waiting lists.

After two successful cohorts of Basketmakers' Professional Development Programmes which have supported 35 basketmakers to take part in this excellent business development programme offered by Cockpit, this year we are supporting two basketmakers to take part in a mixed craft discipline programme which commenced in August this year. Both programmes will be evaluated by participants in all three programmes early next year to guide us as to how best to support basketmakers in the future.

The Traditional Basketry Project (TBP) has moved into Phase 2 after the completion of the Endangered Baskets report in conjunction with Heritage Crafts. The overall aim is to research and record traditional baskets of the UK. Dr. Stephanie Bunn has helped us with formulating an ongoing plan for the future, the aims of which are:

- to set up a website to record traditional baskets and information about them
- to engage a project officer to take the project forward
- to continue to work with volunteers from the TBP subcommittee; and
- to secure further funding to develop the project

Members will have seen that the Journal continues to go from strength to strength with great work from Kim Winter and Anita Lomas in editing and design. The BA was also involved in

the publishing of two books this year – reprints of Olivia Elton Barratt's *Rushwork* and the rush book *Weaving with eight makers*.

The BA's 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary is fast approaching. What should we do to mark the anniversary? A special commemorative edition of the Journal is planned, but what else do members think we should do; suggestions so far have included a party, an exhibition, but we would welcome ideas. Have a think. We have a suggestion box here for ideas – please put your ideas or preferences on a slip of paper and pop them in the box.

As you all know the BA is run by volunteers. There are twelve directors of the Board – Alison Dickens, Anna Stickland, Anne Otley, Clare Revera, Louise Brown, Geraldine Poore, Jo Brook, Pru Todd, Rae Gilliat, Sarah Hatton, Sue Higham, and me. We are very ably supported by others who provide a variety of invaluable help - Mel Hart, Geri Clarke, Iris Hawkes and Dawn Ohlson, Alisha Davidson although this group does change from time to time and I apologise if I have missed anyone out. We are very grateful for all support and I take this opportunity of thanking everyone involved in any way.

There are to be several departures from the Board this year, Alison, Clare, Geraldine, Sue and me. Our thanks go to them for all their efforts over the years. But we are very pleased that several members have expressed an interest in joining the Board or in helping in some way. It is vital to our organisation that we have a pool of willing and able volunteers to keep it alive. Thank you all.
